BRISTOL SPECIAL CARE BABY UNIT



LOCKING'S STRAY CATS

The trapping now finished at Meals on Wheels. I moved on to the Electrical Section, where I caught one wild cat and two pet cats (the latter were course released immediately). At the Contractors' Compound there were four cats, all of which were extremely hard to trap. One in particular was very cunning and just would not take the bait. The other three had been caught, taken for their operations, had their period of convalescence at my house and released again, during which time I still had not managed to catch the fourth cat. Only

when one of the workmen told me that this cat didn't like fish was I able to rectify the procedure using dog food, which was much more to this cat's liking, and I then managed to catch it.

The week before Christmas one of the cats was very ill with flu, so I retrapped it and took it to the vet, but he did not think it would live. However, he treated it for a week and amazingly it pulled through. I then kept it at my home for a week to ensure it's full recovery. It was then released just before the New Year.

Twice a week I see all the cats whilst feeding them. The cats at Meals on Wheels are very shy and run and hide when they see me, but the others at the compound, although very wary of me, stay around and watch me from a distance. Maybe in time they will gain more confidence and trust in me and come a little closer.

Some people on the unit are of the opinion that the cats should have been left alone and not spayed or neutered. I believe that is a very naive attitude and it is because of such attitudes that the cat and dog homes throughout the country are full to capacity. The Cat Protection League tell me that one unspayed female can be responsible for 20,000 offspring in 5 years. Out of the twenty wild cats I found on Locking twelve of them were females; it is not hard to calculate how many cats there could possibly have been living wild on the unit!!

It is obvious that the only solution to this problem is spaying and neutering, which could also help to stop the suffering experienced by some cats when humans become fed up with them and perhaps dump them along with numerous kittens. The Cat Protection League would be only too pleased to give advice on the above mentioned as would any local vet or animal charity.

I would like to say to Service Personnel, if you are thinking of having a cat or dog, are you prepared to take your animal overseas with you and just as prepared to pay for six months quarantine when you return? If the answer is no, then please can I appeal to you NOT to have an animal.

Next month I will give you some information on the operation of the Cat Protection League.

Willie's Corner

On January 1951, I left Southampton on the Union Steamship, Castle Carmarthen Castle, bound for Cape Town, having been posted as a Staff Officer to the Rhodesian Air Training Group at Bulawayo in Southern Rhodesia. On the seventh day out a fancy dress parade was held after dinner. I had dressed as "Little Red Riding Hood", and my wife had dressed as a girl from a harem. A doctor whom we had befriended on the voyage was dressed as an Arab, and he asked my wife if she would enter the competition as his partner, this she agreed to, and they went on to win first prize as the best couple, while I won first prize as the best male competitor.

Ten years later in 1961 I was stationed at Steamer Point in Aden when Iraq threatened Kuwait with invasion (Oh yes it happened before - or nearly). I and four other Officers were sent post haste to Kuwait City to form a Joint Administrating HQ, for the British Forces Arabian Peninsula. We duly

arrived some 24 hours later after a hectic journey via Oman and Bahrain to find that we had gone from the stifling humid heat of Aden to the scorching dry heat of Kuwait and to find that some Airmen had already arrived from the UK. Chaos reigned supreme. It was suddenly realised that the airmen no longer carried a knife fork and spoon and mug on their person, neither did they carry campbeds, (unlike the Army who were settling down nicely thank you very much). I went to see the British Consul in Kuwait City who gave me an authorization to purchase 300 knives, forks, spoons and mugs. The next job was to find some beds. I commandeered a couple of lorries and went to Mina Al Ahmadi oil field where Shell had their headquarters, they kindly loaned me 300 mattresses. These were duly deposited on the concrete floor of a hangar at Kuwait Airfield which became our billet. After I had been in Kuwait for about 14 days, sleeping rough and without a bath, I was invited to spend a night

at Mina Al Ahmadi where Shell had a luxurious air conditioned club with all amenities, not forgetting the beer! After 14 days on Compo rations and orange juice I was ready for it.

I duly arrived and was allocated a single room complete with fridge full of ice cold drinks. After a bath, change of clothing and a beer, I went across to the restaurant for dinner, and afterwards to the bar.

Imagine my surprise when on entering the bar a voice shouted "Good grief, it's Willie." Yes, believe it or not it was the doctor from paragraph one. He was Chief Medical Officer with Shell Mex at Mina Al Ahmadi. It's a small world.

PS. Iraq never did invade and in a matter of weeks, we all went back to where we came from. I never grumbled about Aden after that.



CO's GOOD SHOW AWARD

At each End of Course Conference (ECC), when the students are asked "what was the high point of your training?" the answer is invariably "the Tac Comms/ Ground Defence Exercise" (TCGDX). The undoubted success of this worthwhile exercise is in the main due to the efforts of two outstanding NCOs, Sgt Steve Davies and Cpl Steve Malone.

These exercises are held at Yoxter Military Training Area (YMTA) and take place throughout the year regardless of weather. Although the students only see the end result, a well run and most professional exercise, the prior planning and preparation, often outside normal working hours, is quite substantial.

Sgt Davies, a TG 11 specialist, has been on almost 40 exercises during his tour at RAF Locking, working in most cases 20 hours a day whist at YMTA. Despite on one occasion getting the OIC lost, with the memorable words "Trust me, Sir, I know this place like the back of my hand", (it was foggy) he has shown outstanding dedication and professionalism. Over the past 3 years he has transformed the TCGDX into an excellent training vehicle that not only teaches tactical communications and military field skills, but assists in the overall development of the "whole airman". As recent events in the Gulf have shown, these skills remain highly relevant to service in

today's Royal Air Force.

Similarly, Cpl Malone, RAF Regt, although a relative newcomer compared to Sgt Davies, has left an indelible mark on the running of the exercises. His specialist trade knowledge and experience have been invaluable. Although the students may not have noticed his patience and good humour, these virtues have been like the rest of his work - outstanding. This patience and good humour has even been extended to "peace protesters" when on one memorable occasion a fairly vociferous female protester refused to leave the range area and hugged Cpl Malone whilst expressing sisterly love towards him. He later (using minimum force) ejected her from the area into what must have been the muddlest puddle in Somerset.

In all seriousness, it was Cpl Malone's commonsense and experience that minimised the effect of what otherwise might have been a serious incident. he certainly set the finest example possible to all the trainees on the exercise of self - restraint and professional conduct.


