WHY 10 TORS?

A Letter from OC Admin Wing

Sir,

I was most surprised to open your December/January issue and find reprinted in it no less than five pages of my Ten Tors booklet. I was instantly delighted to see the event being given so much publicity but saddened that there was no explanation as to why the pages had been incorporated. Allow me, please, to say just a few words about this event and its value as far as young airmen and airwomen are concerned.

Ten Tors is a form of Expedition Training, and that, as the GAI on the subject says, is intended "to encourage and foster development of character, leadership and initiative among serving personnel, particularly young officers and airmen". These same objectives apply to Resource and Initiative Training which has always figured prominently in the syllabus of RAF apprentices but sadly has only just begun to find a place in the direct entrant training programme.

Currently our students at Locking spend a week of their course in the Brecon Beacons learning about and practising outdoor pursuits. They also spend 3 or 4 days engaged in a tactical communications exercise, which though geared more to military matters, at least gives a second opportunity to camp out and survive in the "wild". In contrast to these brief programmed activities, Ten Tors extends over 5 or 6 months, during which participants voluntarily give up many of their weekends with one aim in mind - to gain a medal in a very demanding challenge event.

Ten Tors is about walking, navigating and camping in teams of six. Walking demands no special skill, but covering long distances over many hours requires practice and determination, particularly if the ground underfoot is rough moorland and one has on one's back a 30 pound pack. Add mist, hail or scorching sun, and the demands get greater. But success in completing the course and gaining not only individual medals but a team certificate - particularly when the weather is bad teaches the participants a lot about team work and endurance and no small measure of common sense. It also brings to the fore the leadership abilities of many of the individuals.

I am now in my 21st season of Ten Tors and each May I am still impressed by the spirit shown by the participating youngsters and by the intense satisfaction displayed by each individual who collects a medal.

Thank you, Mr Editor, for allowing me to say a few words about this very fine event. If any of your student readers or younger members of the permanent staff are moved to consider participating this year, there is still time for them to qualify for one of the Station's 24 places. A phone call to Flight Sergeant Thrift on ext 391 will secure full details of the training programme. I guarantee that they won't be disappointed, and they may do themselves a lot of good, which they won't necessarily recognise themselves but others will.






STATION EDUCATION SECTION

AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL PERSONNEL FROM PMC

RETIREMENT PROGRAMME - PHASE III

The recent decline in training has resulted in a need by PMC to reduce the current workforce. A Phase III Retirement Programme for all personnel over the age of 40 has been approved and seems the most equitable under the present circumstances. The plan will place older personnel on to an early retirement list thus permitting the retention of those who represent the future of the Royal Air Force. The programme, outlined below, will be put into effect, immediately.

The programme will be called 'RETIREMENT, AGED PERSONNEL, EARLY (RAPE) and personnel who are 'RAPED' will be given the opportunity to seek other jobs within the RAF provided that, while they are 'RAPED' they request a review of their employment status before the actual terminal date. This phase in the process will be called the 'Survey of Capabilities of Retired Early Workers' (SCREW). Only personnel who have been 'RAPED' and 'SCREWED' may apply for a final review.

The final review 'The Study of Termination of Use For Further Education and Development' (STUFFED) will determine the eligibility for retention.

This policy letter authorises that selected personnel may be 'RAPED' once, 'SCREWED' twice - but can be 'STUFFED' as many times as PMC requires.

Personnel who wish to take advantage of the scheme are requested to submit a General Application to their flight commander at the earliest opportunity. Applications will be processed on a 'FIRST COME FIRST SERVED' basis otherwise known as 'DONE'!





THE RUNNING SCENE
